

(I) A FEEDING DEVICE THAT HAS BEEN PERMANENTLY ALTERED SO THAT IT CANNOT ACCOMMODATE MORE THAN FIFTEEN ROUNDS OF AMMUNITION;

(II) AN ATTACHED TUBULAR DEVICE DESIGNED TO ACCEPT, AND CAPABLE OF OPERATING ONLY WITH, .22 CALIBER RIMFIRE AMMUNITION; OR

(III) A TUBULAR MAGAZINE THAT IS CONTAINED IN A LEVER-ACTION FIREARM.


Concerning "assault weapons", only the city of Denver has a ban on firearms defined as such.

The ordinance bans the sale and possession of firearms with "semiautomatic action" or that use detachable magazines with a capacity of 21 or more rounds.

The model DP-12 as manufactured by Standard Manufacturing, neither possesses a magazine in violation of the above-listed ban on large capacity magazines, as each of its two magazines have a capacity of seven cartridges, and an interior capacity of 16.5 linear inches, with an exterior length of 18.03 inches when assembled with receiver end cap, plunger and compressed spring.

Nor does the model DP-12 fall within the definition of an "assault weapon" under the Denver "assault weapon" law, as it employs a pump-action, and not a semi-automatic action.
